CAPTAIN TOM 100

In April 2020, Captain Tom Moore set out round his garden to thank our NHS heroes. One hundred laps later, he had raised an incredible £38.9 million for the NHS Covid-19 appeal. His simple message of hope - "Tomorrow will be a good day" - inspired millions around the world. Friday 30th April would have been his 101st birthday and to honour him we took part in the 'Captain Tom 100 Challenge'. Each class was asked to raise £100 by doing any activity 100 times. Activities ranged from cartwheeling to climbing steps, wearing 100 face masks to skipping, baking 100 cakes to scoring 100 goals, writing 100 word poems to reading 100 pages of a book. This list was endless and everyone got involved. A special mention to Ishaan who raised £120 by baking and selling 100 cakes; Sunai and Ami who raised £243 doing the same and Shalen who used his birthday money to buy 100 food items for Epping Forest Food Bank. I am overwhelmed to say that we surpassed our target, raising £2028.32, which will be going to both King George's and Queen's Hospitals. These are both hospitals in our local community where funds will be used in their accident and emergency departments and in the area of bereavement counselling. Thank you to our parents for encouraging your children to be proactive and thoughtful. We really value your support.

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GREEN FINGERS

SPOTLIGHT ON...



This half-term's spotlight is on Susan Cheshire, Head of Swimming in the Prep and Senior School. She believes learning to swim is about understanding and trust; understanding how you float and interact with water and then trusting that the water will support you. Susan advises swimmers to 'Be conscious of your posture and aim to feel balanced. As you swim don't try too hard and always think forwards!' Susan introduced Total Immersion to Bancroft's a few years ago. It is an approach of how to think about swimming with balance, streamlining and efficiency and investigating how we can behave more like aquatic mammals. Susan said, 'We don't use swimming floats to teach the pupils how to swim, they learn how to interact with the water to find balance and stability before they go on to learn whole body propulsive movements.' Implementing the Total Immersion method into the school has been a great achievement for Susan, with the standard of swimming at school improving. Along with other staff members, she took the Senior School swimmers on their first open water swimming trip to Montenegro in 2019. This was an amazing experience for both pupils and teachers. 'It was such a pleasure to swim beside them surrounded by such breath-taking scenery.' Susan prefers to swim outside in cold, open water herself in a test of physical and mental resilience. She is the only teacher at school who teaches the children from their first year as Alphas all the way through the Senior School. Next year her first Alphas will enter the Upper Sixth! 'We share a swimming journey together, where they may start as nervous non-swimmers and grow to become confident swimmers who come to enjoy and love being in the water'. She also teaches adults who want achieve their own swimming goals, from to overcoming a fear of water to training for a triathlon, open water events or even swimming the English Channel. She believes everyone can benefit from time in the water. As a child, Susan's mum was a huge supporter of her swimming and helped at her swimming club. She passed away when Susan was quite young and, in her memory, the Club donated a shield in her honour for the 50m butterfly.

'I remember standing on the blocks for the start of that race, so determined to win. I found out last year, that not only was my name the first one to be engraved on the shield, 34 years later, I still hold the record for the event!' We are so proud to know you, Susan Cheshire!
