#### **HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT**

On Wednesday, 26<sup>th</sup> April, Prep 2s had the privilege of visiting the Houses of Parliament. With a pair of headphones, they wandered the historic halls, soaking in the intricacies of British Parliament. We started the day by taking a train to Westminster and having a memorable tour around the Houses. We saw pictures strewn on the walls, representing important moments in Britain's history. We first saw the House of Commons, where a couple of hours later our Prime Minister had a debate. We could see the chair of the speaker (the person who shouts "order") and several rows of seats above us. New bills (laws) are made in the House. The colour green represents the House of Commons. We later went to the House of Lords where we could see the chair which our King would sit in when addressing a new law to be made. Beside him would sit our Queen. The House of Lords scrutinises bills that have been approved by the House of Commons, while It regularly reviews and amends them. We saw a mace that was rested on the table in the centre of the room, and were told if people got angry, they lifted it. The colour red represents the House of Lords. We also had a workshop where we had a debate and we were split into two groups. The new bill that we were debating on was banning homework (which I did not support). We learnt all about how a law was made and we met the

Chingford and Woodford Green MP, Rt Hon Sir Iain Duncan Smith. After eating lunch, our day was done, and we headed back to school. We had a wonderful time, and on behalf of the year, I thank the teachers who planned this amazing school trip for us.



## **HEVER CASTLE**

Hever Castle is located in the village of Hever, Kent. It began as a country house, built in the 13<sup>th</sup> century. Anne Boleyn is believed to have been born in 1501 and spent her early childhood at Hever Castle, which had belonged to her family since 1462. Having focused on Anne Boleyn as part of our History curriculum this term, we felt it apt to visit her home. This half term the Betas explored the romantic double moated 13<sup>th</sup> century castle which houses historic 16<sup>th</sup> century portraits, paintings, furniture, tapestries and treasures. They visited many rooms including the library, Henry's Chamber, the dining room and the Staircase Gallery to name but a few. The children were then treated to a Tudor dancing workshop where they learned country dances of poorer Tudors and the Polka as danced by Anne herself. # LUNCHTIME CONCERT


