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Our Background

Bancroft's school is an HMC co-educational school for approximately 1100 students aged 7-18. Founded by the Drapers' Company in 1737, as a result of a bequest from Francis Bancroft, the school still maintains its historic links with the City, combining the best of traditional values with innovative practices.

The school moved to its present site at Woodford Wells in 1889. The fine Victorian quad was designed by Sir Arthur Blomfield and provides a dining hall, chapel, library and classrooms. There have been many additions to the original buildings over the years, which have ensured that Bancroft's has first rate facilities, including a swimming pool and sports' hall, on site. Bancroft's became fully coeducational in 1979. In 1990 a Preparatory school was opened, providing education for children aged 7-11.

The Sixth Form

The Sixth Form at Bancroft's is a vibrant, intellectually stimulating and friendly place which benefits from the school's excellent facilities. The school has a very strong academic record at A Level and offers a wide range of co-curricular activities and leadership opportunities to students, allowing them to develop outstanding interpersonal skills as well as achieving excellent examination results.

There is a very real sense of being part of a supportive community too, with students from an eclectic mix of backgrounds learning to work together.

A number of recent leavers are gaining real-world experience through degree apprenticeships and placement years at prestigious companies such as Morgan Stanley, ILL Residential, and Dyson.

Life in the Sixth Form at Bancroft's will provide an exciting and hugely rewarding experience that will not only prepare you for the rigours of A-Levels, but also provide a transformative experience that will equip you with the life skills that will enable you to flourish whatever your chosen career path may be.

The Sixth Form is a time to develop your personal talents and interests, your scholarly approach to study, and your skills of leadership and teamwork so that you are ready to take on the challenges of life beyond school. The two years in the Sixth Form act as a bridge between the relatively ordered style of GCSE courses and the more independent and dynamic world of university, work, and life beyond the school gates. While gaining academic and personal independence, students continue to be fully supported by the Housemasters and Housemistresses, tutors, and the wider pastoral team, who are always on hand to offer individual advice and guidance as they navigate the challenges of A-levels, university, work, and the world beyond the Bancroft's gates.

Participation in the wide range of societies, sports and activities beyond the classroom, both within the house structure and outside it, is an essential part of being a Bancroftian. These areas will enrich your Sixth Form experience immensely; they will help you to enjoy life and support your academic studies; and they will also help you to develop vital skills: in leadership and team-work; in organisation and responsibility; and in resilience and adaptability, all of which are highly valued in later life.

Sixth Formers have access to a spacious common room in which to relax and socialise. Students are kept well refreshed by the dedicated cafeteria, which is found in the main common room. The Sixth Form library is an area for quiet study and is furnished with a range of workstations that are equipped with IT infrastructure. Students also benefit from access to a full-time Head of Careers, Innovation, and Entrepreneurship who can offer advice and guidance on applying on developing work skills, CVs writing, and applying to the most competitive internships and degree apprenticeships.

We hope that anyone joining the Sixth Form at Bancroft's school will look for the opportunity to learn new skills and contribute to the school community, ensuring their time in Bancroft's Sixth Form is well spent and of value to the rest of their lives. A Level Results 2023

Bancroft's celebrated another year of outstanding A Level results, with its students demonstrating exceptional academic performance and securing places at top universities. An impressive 89% of students achieved A*-B grades, marking an increase from pre-pandemic years. A notable 66% earned A*-A grades, with over a third securing A*s in their chosen subjects.


An increasing number of students have gained places on highly competitive degree apprenticeship programmes with the likes of Dyson, PWC, and JP Morgan.

Others choose to enter directly into employment or take a gap year that usually involves some charitable/volunteering work overseas.


The post-18 options are increasing every year and our Careers Office can provide extensive and detailed guidance on all available options.

Entry Information and Requirements

Entry to the Sixth Form is on the basis of performance in an entrance examination and at interview. The 16+ entrance examination takes place in November when candidates are in Year 11. Offers are made in December.

Pupils joining our Sixth Form will need to be academically capable and hardworking; they will also need a firm foundation of success at GCSE. In practice they should expect to gain a significant number of 8 or 9 grades in their GCSE subjects. In the Lower Sixth (Year 12) students start with four subjects or three subjects plus an EPQ or equivalent research pathway.

Closing date for acceptance of places

We are looking for students who are likely to achieve a minimum of five 8 or 9 grades at GCSE, and at least a 8 in the subjects they wish to study in the Lower Sixth (Year 12), and who will be academically and socially able to make the most of being in our Sixth Form.

Entrance Exam

All applicants will sit an online aptitude test (lasting approximately 45 minutes) as well as two I hour exams, from a choice of the following subject areas. These exams should be in subjects the candidate is studying at GCSE Level and intends to take for A Level or subjects which relate to those that will be taken.

- Art
- History
- Biology
- Latin
- Chemistry
- Mathematics*
- English Literature Physics
- French
- Religious Studies
- Geography
- Spanish
- German

Applicants nominate the two subject areas on which they would like to be examined by indicating their choices on the registration form.

*Candidates wanting to take Mathematics A Level must sit the Mathematics entrance paper.

Successful candidates wishing to take Maths and Further Maths will be provided with a pack of work to complete over the summer. They will then sit a diagnostic test on the first day of the academic year, to help reach a conclusion about whether Further Maths is a suitable path to take.

Revision

Specific revision will not be required, and the questions will be appropriate to all GCSE exam boards and syllabus.

Interviews

Successful candidates will be called back for interview approximately two weeks after the test day. Offers, conditional upon GCSE results and achieving a minimum of five 8 or 9 grades, will then be sent out by post within the following fortnight.

Candidates called for interview for Art will be required to bring with them a portfolio showing their recent work.

Candidates called for interview for Drama will be asked to take part in a short audition.

Applications

Registrations are made online and must be accompanied by a non-returnable registration fee of £125.

Please note that if you are applying for an Assisted Place you must first complete an Initial Assessment of Income Form (IAIF). We will then review the financial criteria and either invite you to register for an Assisted Place with a reduced fee, or invite you to register for a Fee-Paying place.

A copy of the applicant's birth certificate or passport must be uploaded together with your registration form for all applications.

Upon acceptance of a place, we require a £1000 deposit. Please note that this deposit should be paid online. We are unable to accept cash deposits. If in receipt of an Assisted Place, this deposit will also be means tested.



Please note that on receipt of an application, we will contact the candidate's present school for a reference and you may wish to inform them of your application before they hear from us. Scan the QR code to register.

Late Applications

Late applications for Sixth Form entry may be considered; candidates should contact the school with their GCSE exam results in August. We are looking for students who have achieved a minimum of five 8 or 9 grades at GCSE, and at least an 8 in the subjects they wish to study in the Lower Sixth (Year 12), and who will be academically and socially able to make the most of being in our Sixth Form.

If we are able to consider late applications, candidates may then be invited for interview; offers would be made subject to receiving a good academic reference from their current school Head.

Fee-Paying Places

For candidates offered a full fee-paying place, the school fees are payable by direct debit in ten equal instalments, starting in August, and are reviewed annually. Fees include tuition, lunch,



the use of text and library books, stationery and scientific materials and games. Fees charged by external examination boards are added to the fee account in the relevant years. Please scan the QR code for details of our current fees.

Sixth Form Assisted Places and Awards

Bancroft's awards Assisted Places and Music Awards in the Sixth Form. Potential award holders should have mainly grade 8 or 9 predictions from their current school in addition to a very positive reference. In assessing potential award holders, we look for academic leadership and intellectual curiosity. We try to distinguish the bright from the well drilled, the inspired from the effective and we aim to uncover flair. Considerable time is taken to ensure that the process is fair.

Candidates who are offered a Music Award or Assisted Place must also fulfil the entry requirements. These awards continue whilst the student maintains their educational potential and abides by the school rules and policies.

Assisted Places

Bancroft's is committed to broadening access to the school by offering to eligible parents/guardians financial support with the payment of school fees through the provision of Assisted Places. These Assisted Places are designed to enable children of high ability from all backgrounds to enjoy a Bancroft's education, where their parents/guardians might not otherwise be able to afford the full school fee.

An Assisted Place is a means-tested award and candidates are required to pass the entrance exam to be eligible.

The assessment of the level of Financial Assistance is calculated on a graduated scale after parents/ guardians have submitted a comprehensive confidential statement of their income and assets, on a Financial Disclosure Form (FDF), together with copies of any additional information, confirmations, and supporting documentation, which may be required.

Assisted Places will be awarded once the school's financial assessment criteria has been met: Assisted Places are awarded based on performance in the entrance exam, school reports and an interview.

Please note that if you are applying for an Assisted Place you must first complete an Initial Assessment of Income Form (IAIF). We will then review the financial criteria and either invite you to register for an Assisted Place with a reduced fee, or invite you to register for a Fee-Paying place.

Music Awards

Music Award holders are offered free tuition on one or two instruments. Please note, Bancroft's only offers fee-remission for Assisted Places. A student may be both a recipient of an Assisted Place and a Music Award, eligibility for each is entirely separate.

A Music Award holder will be expected to make a strong contribution to the music department and the musical life of the school by attending, and performing in, a variety of concerts and musical events; setting a good example to, and encouraging other students. They should attend weekly instrumental lessons and ensemble activities and be seen to make good progress on their main instrument. In addition, they will also be a member of one of the school choirs.

Music plays a major part in the life of the school and there are many opportunities for students to perform. Concerts are held regularly throughout the year, including an annual visit to the Drapers' Hall in London. Weekly musical groups for senior students include: Bancroft's Sinfonia, Sinfonietta, Bancroft's Singers, Bancroft's Big Band, Camerata (strings), Bancroft's Soul Band, Concert Band, Cello Ensemble, Senior Barbershop groups (boys & girls), Junior Choir Boys' Voices, Girls' Choir.

Music Assessments for the Award take place in the November of the year before proposed entry. The Award will be conditional on meeting the school's minimum entry requirement of five 8 or 9 grades at GCSE, and candidates are expected to be at least Grade 7 in practical skills.

For the audition, candidates will be asked to perform two contrasting pieces on their main instrument, to complete some sight reading, aural tests and a short interview. Music that requires an accompaniment must not be performed unaccompanied. Candidates are welcome to bring their own accompanist, but this is not essential.

Music Award candidates must also arrange for Mrs Whitbread, Director of Music, to receive by no later than the published date of the year before entry a report/ reference from their instrumental teacher and any other relevant information regarding musical events that they have been involved in within the last twelve months. If a candidate requires an accompanist they will also need to send in the music for this.

Drapers' Academic Awards

At 16+ we offer Drapers' Academic Awards before students join us in the Sixth Form.

We do not offer fee remission for students who receive Drapers' Academic Awards; fee remission is only applicable to Assisted Places.

Although awards do not carry monetary values, they are a prestigious offer extended to only the best candidates - both internal and external. Academic award holders are among the most talented students here, and are often leading lights in their chosen subjects, making a wide and valuable contribution to the life of the school. Academic awards are held for one year at a time and are re-awarded each year during the school.

Other Drapers' Awards

Once students join the school there are opportunities in the L6 and U6 to achieve an additional variety of awards in creative subjects, Drama, Sport, for contributions to the school community as well as for the other key subject areas; these awards are given annually. We aim to recognise excellence and contribution in all areas of school life and for embodying and contributing to our school values; we try to ensure that all our students are given opportunities to win recognition for their contributions and achievements during their time in the school.

Awards will be based on the performance and commitment shown in the relevant area during each school year. As with other awards (but with the exception of Music), Sport, Art, Computing and DT, Drama and Community Awards are given every year and can be re-awarded.

Co-Curricular Activities

Within our vibrant community, we strive to cater to all individual's passions and interests, ensuring a balance between academic and co-curricular life. We empower Sixth Form students to initiate and lead societies that mirror their own enthusiasms. These societies range from Mindfulness and Current Affairs to the world of Technical Theatre, reflecting the diverse interests of our students. An impressive array of 250 clubs and societies are held throughout the year...and the count is ever increasing.

Sports

All students participate in a vibrant weekly programme of PE and games. The choice for Sixth Formers is a wide one, including climbing, mountain biking, yoga and squash in addition to our major curricular sports. Alongside our timetabled activities we offer a wide co-curricular sporting programme which includes fencing, basketball and badminton. The school runs teams for all major sports across various skill levels. These teams maintain an active schedule of fixtures against nearby schools and have achieved considerable accomplishments in regional and national tournaments.

Music

Diverse orchestras, choirs, and ensembles, encompassing various musical genres, rehearse regularly, presenting a wealth of musical options. We encourage all new students to explore and embrace the musical avenues the school offers. Many Bancroftians also benefit from private tuition provided by our visiting music professionals.

Drama

There are plenty of opportunities to get involved in drama, both on and backstage. We have an ambitious annual school production, for which students from year 10 upwards can audition. Recent productions have included Crazy For You, The Winter's Tale, Sweeney Todd and Chicago. Each year there is a House Drama competition, for which all houses produce a short play involving all year groups. In addition, students may take LAMDA examinations in the Speaking of Verse and Prose up to grade 8 (Gold Medal) with lessons given by visiting staff.

Combined Cadet Force/ Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme

Membership of the thriving CCF, which includes both army and air force sections, is an option for L4th (Year 9) upwards; new members of the Sixth Form may also join the CCF. The Duke of Edinburgh's Scheme is also available to students in the L4th upwards. Bancroft's students enjoy great success at Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. New members of the Sixth Form are encouraged to participate in the scheme.











Pastoral Care

We take tremendous pride in the exceptional pastoral support we provide at Bancroft's. It underpins all that we do, enabling students to flourish and make the most of their opportunities. We endeavour to foster a friendly, supportive and caring environment in which each student is cherished and nurtured and their individual needs addressed. We offer proactive pastoral care with a focus on wellbeing and resilience, equipping the students for life beyond the school bubble.

The House system lies at the heart of our pastoral care with tutors and House staff being key points of contact for students and parents throughout their time at school. On a daily basis, the tutor is the first port of call, fostering the academic, co-curricular and pastoral welfare of each student. The House staff are supported in their role by the Deputy Head, Pastoral, who is also the Designated Lead for Safeguarding and Child Protection matters. The Heads of Year and Head of Sixth Form add an extra strand of support, attending to the needs and trends of the wider year group.

We recognise that adolescence can be a turbulent time and sometimes a student may experience difficulties which require specialist and professional help. Pupils can self-refer to the counselling service available in school if they feel they need it and we will always source help from outside if necessary, liaising with the student and the family as appropriate.

The House staff oversee all House weekly house assemblies during which teachers and students share thoughts, celebrate achievements and perform. Sport, drama, music and spoken English competitions between the four Houses promote a friendly rivalry. Each House celebrates its own identity with events such as family evenings which help bond parents, students and staff. The vertical nature of House activities means that the younger students learn from older role models and in turn, the latter derive huge benefit from mentoring the former. It is a mutually enriching dynamic and one which many remember with fondness when they leave.



Important Information

Fees and Charges

The Registration Fee is £125.

A £1000 deposit is payable on acceptance of a place; this sum will be credited to the final account.

The full school fee is reviewed annually; details of the current fee can be found on the school website www. bancrofts.org. It includes tuition, the use of text and library books, stationery and scientific materials and games. Lunches are also included in the fee. Fees charged by external examination boards are added to the fee account in the relevant years.

Available extras include tuition in instrumental music, CCF, Scouts, Duke of Edinburgh Award, field trips and optional excursions.

Payment of Fees

School fees are charged in advance, at the beginning of each term, or payable by direct debit in ten equal instalments starting in August. Overdue accounts are subject to a late payment charge. Any questions relating to the payment of fees should be addressed to the Bursar, email: bursar@bancrofts.org.

School fees cannot be refunded for any term or part of a term for which a student is absent through illness, accident or other cause.

Residence

Pupils must normally reside with their parents or legal guardian. We ask that all students live close enough to the school to ensure that their welfare is, in the Head's opinion, not put in jeopardy and also to allow them to participate fully in Bancroft's extensive after-school and weekend co-curricular and sporting programmes. Any change in place of residence must be notified immediately to the Head.

Breakfast

Breakfast is served in the dining servery from 7.45am to 8.15am every morning. A range of breakfast items is on sale.

The Library

For those who arrive early, leave late or who simply wish to make use of the facilities, the Library is open and supervised from 8.00am to 6.00pm.

Bus Service

We operate a minibus service from Loughton Station to Bancroft's school; younger year groups have priority, although if there are spaces, Sixth Formers are welcome to use the service. There is, at present, no charge for this.

School Nurse

We have a full time school Nurse who attends to the needs of students. Minor injuries/problems are dealt within the surgery. If students need to go home the school Nurse will contact parents directly. It is therefore vital that details of changes in contact numbers are passed to the school without delay. The school Nurse is willing to supervise the administration of medication during the school day should parents wish. Parents must send a written request to the school Nurse if any prescribed medicines need to be administered at school and complete the consent form. However, unless it is necessary, we do not encourage individuals to bring medication to school.

Dress

The uniform ethos we have developed is 'modern professional'. Different workplaces have adopted varying interpretations of dress code, from completely casual to very formal. All workplaces are different, and each must decide on what is best for that particular environment.



Our interpretation of modern profession means that Sixth Form students should dress in smart clothes, suitable for a working and learning environment. Scan the QR code for more information.
